COMMISSION REPORT

From Your City Commission

During the month of January, the Commission approved Consulting Services with Conklin, Porter & Holmes Engineers, Inc. to design improvements to Fisher Road and the new Town Center's Hickory Grove Park Road; approved Resolution #2001-01 authorizing the City Manager to apply for a Highway Beautification Grant, and to enter into a Highway Landscaping Maintenance Agreement with the Florida Department of Transportation for the Beautification and Maintenance of State Road 434; approved Preliminary Engineering Plans for the proposed Belfaire Subdivision located on State Road 434 east of the Greenway; approved the Acceptance of Water and Sewer System Improvements for Parkstone, Unit 2, authorized the City Manager to enter into a Contract with McDermitt, Davis, Puckett & Company, P.A, a C.P.A. firm to perform the Fiscal Year 2000 Audit, and approved the use of stamped asphalt beautification enhancements at the Intersection of Tuskawilla Road and Winter Springs Boulevard. The Commission in accordance with the requirements of the City Charter, named the following individuals to the Districting Commission: Mr. William Poe; Mr. Jim Mathews; Mr. Byron Giltz; Mr. Vernon Rozelle; Mr. Lee Ferguson; Mr. Charles Sorokin and Mr. Jim McShae. The Districting Committee is responsible for maintaining the number of voters in election districts in compliance with law as the city grows.

At a Special Meeting held January 18, 2001, the Commission discussed suggested changes recommended by the Charter Review Advisory Committee. Subsequent meetings were held on February 21st and 22nd. No final decisions have been agreed to by the Commission, and this subject will be back on the agenda in April.

At the February 12, 2001 Meeting the Commission discussed Animal

Control issues as they relate to Code Enforcement practices, and directed Staff to come back with a recommendation to improve the city's animal control ordinance that will maximize the penalties available for these infractions; authorized the City Manager to enter into an agreement with the underwriting firms of Gardner Michael, Hanifen Imhoff, and William R. Hough & Co. to underwrite the issuance of 1990 and 1991 bonds for the Tuskawilla Lighting and Beautification District and approved refinancing of the Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds reducing debt payments in excess of 10% due to declining interest rates in the bond market.

In other business, the City Commission agreed to enter into a contract with "Avid Neo Geo" to pro-

vide marketing and communication services to promote the City, adopted Resolution #2001-06 requesting Seminole County Commissioners to approve the renewal of the One-Cent Sales Tax for Transportation Projects and Schools, approved Ordinance 2001-09, prohibiting Trailer and Revolving Signs, and approved a contract with Mountain View Productions for the Annual Fourth of July Celebration at Central Winds Park.

During this quarter the Commission also discussed a proposed Respite Center for the Homeless to be located on Old Sanford/Oviedo Road, and requested the city attorney to determine if the property is properly zoned.

CHARTER REVIEW REFERENDUM DELAYED TO FALL

A referendum on revisions to the City Charter was originally scheduled for May in order to piggyback on the County Referendum to reinstate the 1-cent Local Option Sales Tax. The County Commission choose to delay the referendum on the sales tax until this fall. Therefore the referendum on Charter changes will be delayed accordingly.

At the January 18, 2001 Special Meeting the Charter Review Advisory Committee presented its recommendations for revising the

City Charter to the City Commission. The Commission has completed two workshops reviewing the committee's recommendations. Additional workshops will be held in April to complete the Commission's review.

Public meetings on the revised charter will probably be scheduled in June, July and August. The June Newsletter will highlight the Charter Review Project and provide detailed information regarding proposed changes.

MARY NORTON Will Be Missed By Everyone!

On a very sad note, former City Clerk Mary T. Norton passed away on January 18, 2001. Mary served in the position of City Clerk from January 10, 1970 to September 30, 1994. Mary was held in highest regard by city officials and fellow employees. She will be missed by all of us. The Commission is discussing a number of alternatives to appropriately honor her memory and long service with the City of Winter Springs.



PRAISE THE LORD PASS THE DEMEROL AND GRAB THE HELMET ON THE WAY OUT

*A Case for the Helmet Law

The new battle cry around the McLemore house these days is; Praise the Lord (for letting me survive my recent motor bike accident) pass the Demerol (great stuff when it hurts all over) and grab the helmet on the way out of the house (and put the darn thing on before you get on your bicycle, motor-bike, or motor-cycle.)

It was only a few weeks ago when my wife and I decided to get away to Nassau for the weekend. When we left the ship we rented two motor bikes to ride around the island.

We had been riding for about three hours. We were only a few blocks from the ship when out of nowhere a car traveling in the wrong lane suddenly appeared in front of me forcing me off the road and into the street-side wall of a building. On my body's journey to the street my head hit the wall of the building knocking me into the twilight zone. Some bystanders untangled me from the motor bike while my wife negotiated with God about my future. You know the routine... Dear God, can't we work this out. Just let him wake up and I'll...

After a few minutes of in your face instruction from my wife, my eyes did begin to open and I suddenly understand the meaning of "PAIN", LOTS OF PAIN. Pain everywhere, and that's when I learned about the amazing properties of "Demerol". That's DEMEROL, industrial strength pain reliever.

Now lets get down to the important part of the story. There was another injury I haven't spoken about yet. What I am talking about here is that light scratch mark all the

way across my forehead. It was only slightly visible, didn't hurt, and was completely healed in only a couple of days. That was the scratch made from the compression of my helmet against my head after hitting the building wall. And when my lifeless body finished its unaltered journey to the pavement that helmet was still snugly attached to my head doing what it was designed to do...saving lives.

How "fortunate" I was that the rental bike insurance carrier required the rental company to mandate helmets. How "unfortunate" we are that the Florida Legislature in its infinite wisdom repealed in July 2000 the mandatory helmet law in Florida.

I know the argument. If someone wants to kill themselves on a motor bike, why should the government get in their way? The problem with this argument is that I, like many bikers, was doing everything that I was supposed to do. It was the driver of that car, traveling in the wrong lane, the one that did not have the decency to even stop that caused me to get hurt. I ask you to give some thought to my real life experience here. I know in my heart that helmet saved my life. What could possibly justify repealing this reasonable requirement for personal safety as a matter of state law? If you agree with me, write your legislators and let them know how you feel. Believe it or not, they really do like to hear from you on matters like this. If not and you have an accident, I hope you get to Praise the Lord, Pass the Demerol and Grab the Helmet on your next trip out.

RESIDENTS OPPOSE PLANNED RESPITE CENTER

An over-flow crowd of Winter Springs residents turned out recently to hear plans for a proposed Respite Center for the homeless to be built in the Winter Springs Industrial Park off State Road 419 in Winter Springs.

The March 21, 2001 Public Meeting was called by the City Commission to review reports from city officials who have been studying operations of Respite Centers and their impacts on their surrounding neighborhoods. Commissioner's Cindy Gennell and Robert Miller, Community Development Director Charles Carrington and Police Chief Dan Kerr gave city officials and the residents the results of their site visits and study of Respite Center for the homeless in Savannah, Georgia, Washington D.C., Chicago, Illinois and Indianapolis, Indiana.

Although supportive of the need for such a facility, the majority of the residents were strongly opposed to the facility being located in Winter Springs.

The inquiries by city officials concluded Respite Center's provide an important social service but that Respite Centers for the homeless are most successful when located in urban centers where the homeless problem exist and near support services as opposed to outlying suburban

areas like Winter Springs. The inquiries also disclosed that persons with communicable diseases such as Aids and Tuberculosis and chronic substance abuse were housed in the centers despite procedures put in place to screen them out from the resident population, and it was also disclosed that the residents of the facility are free to leave at any time in spite of agreements between the patient and Respite Center for the patient to be transported back to the agency referring them to the Respite Center. Police Chief Dan Kerr reported that Respite Center officials in Savannah advised him that their greatest disappointment was with the amount of drugs that made its way into the facility.

As a result of the information gained in the public meeting City Manager Ron McLemore advised the Commission that staff had concerns relative to the site being properly zoned and requested the Commission delay any further action on the Center until he and the City Attorney could complete an analysis of zoning. The zoning report is due back to the Commission at its April 23, 2001 meeting.

PUBLIC WORKS/UTILITY DEPARTMENT

OAK HOLLOW PARK (formerly TROTWOOD CONNECTOR)

Funding is in place and work has begun on the formally designated Oak Hollow Park. This linear park will include several tot lots, benches, lighting, landscaping and irrigation. The work is projected to be completed by the end of May.

IRRIGATION RESTRICTIONS

The below average rainfall for the last several years has resulted in increased irrigation demands for both reclaimed and potable water customers. Current St. Johns River Water Management District restrictions are; even numbered homes irrigate Thursdays and Sundays; odd numbered homes on Wednesday and Saturday. Although reclaimed water is not included in the SJRWMD restrictions, the City is currently considering including reclaimed water in the mandatory restrictions. Until then, we are asking for voluntary compliance.

PUBLIC WORKS - Mosquito Control

With summer rapidly approaching, the Mosquito Spraying is ready to go. Spraying is done based on receiving a minimum 5 complaints per zone. The City is divided into six zones and each time the spraying is conducted the complaint count is reset to zero. Please feel free to contact as needed the Public Works office at 327-2669 to log your complaint.

S.R. 419 IMPROVEMENTS

FDOT is planning to add right hand turn lanes for southbound S.R. 419 at Edgemon Avenue and Moss Road. In addition, FDOT is designing dual left turn lanes for southbound S.R. 419 at S.R. 434 along with resurfacing and restriping on S.R. 419. Both projects are tentatively projected for the third quarter of 2001.

S.R. 434 LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE – EAST OF TUSKAWILLA ROAD

The City took over the median maintenance from FDOT at an increased level of service this past March. We also applied for a Highway Beautification Grant to landscape and irrigate the medians. We will be notified whether we were successful in receiving the grant in July.

FLORIDA POWER AND LIGHT REPOLING

Expect to see increased activity in FP&L's repoling project along their power easement. They have completed their work in the Oviedo area and will be concentrating next in the Winter Springs area. The work is limited to replacement of their distribution poles in the transmission easement. The FP&L easement traverses the City through Winding Hollow, Oak Forest and Tusawilla.

WINDING HOLLOW/PARKSTONE TRAFFIC SIGNAL

The Pizzuti Co. has contracted for the installation of the traffic signal at the Winding Hollow/Parkstone entrances at S.R. 434. This \$140,000 project is being largely funded by Pizzuti as required by their developers agreement. Once the delivery schedule for the mast arms is known, a completion date can be established.

VISTAWILLA DRIVE & S.R. 434 TRAFFIC SIGNAL

The City Commission directed staff to work with a consultant to begin the design of a traffic signal at Vistawilla Drive & S.R. 434. Although the installation of a signal has been approved by FDOT largely through the efforts of the Mayor and Commission, funding from FDOT is not available for two to three years. The Commission wants to proceed and complete the design so that when a funding source is identified, possibly in the coming fiscal year, the project is ready to proceed.

FISHER ROAD PAVING AND DRAINAGE

Surveying is complete and preliminary design is underway. The inclusion of any traffic calming devices is still a pending issue which we expect to provide to the City Commission in May or June. Construction is still anticipated for the fall of 2001.

OAK FOREST WALL AND BEAUTIFICATION DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Construction is 90% complete as of March. The wall construction is projected to be completed within the next 90 days. The associated signage, landscaping and irrigation will be installed when the overall Tuskawilla Road landscaping is installed towards the end of the project, September 2001.

TUSKAWILLA LIGHTING AND BEAUTIFICATION DISTRICT

With the receipt of the favorable Supreme Court decision supporting the bond validation proceedings, we are working with the contractor, Cathcart Construction Co., to establish a date to begin construction. This expected to occur within the next thirty days.

WINTER SPRINGS FIRE DEPARTMENT

For the three-month period of December 2000, January 2001, February 2001, the Fire Department answered the following calls for service:

Fires	46	48% increase over same period last year.
EMS	414	2% decrease over same period last year.
Medical Transports	251	10% decrease over same period last year.
False Alarms	5	29% decrease over same period last year.
Mutual Aid	213	4% increase over same period last year.
Other Calls	318	52% increase over same period last year.
Total Alarms	783	7% increase over same period last year.

The average response time for emergency and non-emergency calls was 5 minutes 40 seconds. The estimated total property loss resulting from fire was \$141,500.



Stove Top FireStop Automatic Fire Extinguisher Program

The Winter Springs Fire Department will install free of charge a StoveTop FireStop Automatic Fire Extinguisher for residents who qualify. The Department received a \$5000.00 grant from the Allstate Insurance Company to purchase cooking stove fire extinguisher devices. These devices are for residents who are elderly and live alone, are disabled or have had past stovetop fires. For information please call (407) 327-7562.

Child and Infant Seat Safety Checks

Firefighters from the Winter Springs Fire Department have been trained to perform child and infant safety seat checks. If you need assistance to properly secure your child or infant safety seat, stop by either fire station and our firefighters will be happy to help you.

Sharps Container Program

The Winter Springs Fire Department in cooperation with Seminole County Solid Waste Division offers – FREE OF CHARGE – sharps containers for used needles and a disposal program. Simply come to the fire station, pick up a container and return it when it is _ full. REMEMBER DO NOT FILL THE CONTAINER PAST THE FULL LINE. THE BIOHAZARDOUS WASTE TRANSPORT COMPANY WILL NOT ACCEPT CONTAINERS THAT HAVE BEEN OVERFILLED.

Bio-Medical Waste

One of our biggest hazards, as pre-hospital care providers, is getting stuck with someone else's needle. In order to help keep public safety personnel safe and healthy, we offer some suggestions:

- Fire stations distribute free containers as indicated above that are used to dispose of used sharp medical waste, such as needles, generated from your home.
- Fill the containers to the line on the side only. If not filled correctly, waste disposers will not pick up the containers. You may be asked to transfer your sharps into an appropriate container.
- Sharps containers must be dropped off for disposal to an appropriate facility, such as the fire station. At that time you may request another container.

Smoke Detector Program

Does your smoke detector work? Call the Winter Springs Fire Department at (407) 327-7562 for a free home survey. If you need a smoke detector, one will be provided free of charge.

Fire Hydrant Testing

The Fire Department tests each fire hydrant, within the City limits for proper operation twice each year. Currently the City has 880 fire hydrants with more installations scheduled.

Keep Your Home Safe from Brush Fires

Weather conditions are once again suitable for brush fires. If your home borders wooded areas, create a 30 – 100 foot safety zone around your home by:

- Make sure landscaping within 30 feet of the house is adequately watered and maintained. Don't give fire a path of travel to your home.
- Clearing leaves and pine needles from roofs and gutters.
- Raking up and disposing of leaves, dead limbs and twigs. Clear all flammable vegetation from around structures.
- Remove dead tree branches that overhang structures.
- Keep tree branches trimmed back 15 - 20 feet from

homes. Thin out treetops to reduce the chance of "crown fires".

- Make sure homes have adequate access for fire apparatus.

For the safety of residents, the City Commission prohibits open burning.

Disability / Special Needs Citizen Registry

Are you, or do you know someone who is disabled, handicapped, or requires assistance with daily living activities, and has no one to rely on in the event that an evacuation is required because of a hurricane or other natural or man-made disaster? For those residents in Winter Springs, the Winter Springs Fire Department would like to offer the ability to register these people in our Special Needs Registry. HURRICANE SEASON BEGINS JUNE 1st ARE YOU PREPARED?

Your **Family Disaster Supplies Kit** should include:

Water - One gallon per person per day. Keep at least a three-day supply. (2 qt. for drinking, 2 qt. for cooking & sanitation)

Food - Three-day supply of non-perishable food. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking and little or no water. Do not forget the special needs of

infants or persons on special diets.

First Aid Kit - Common supplies like bandages, tape, scissors, aspirin, etc.

Tools & Supplies - Cooking and eating supplies, non-electric can opener, flash light with extra batteries, battery powered radio with extra batteries, toilet paper, paper towels, soap, bleach, personal hygiene items, and a plastic bucket with a tight lid with plastic garbage bags & ties (for personal sanitation uses).

Clothing & Bedding - Sturdy shoes, rain gear, blankets or sleeping bags, hat, work gloves, sunglasses.

Special Items: Medications, glasses or contacts lenses

For Baby: Formula, baby food, diapers, bottles, toys

For Children: Favorite stuffed animal, small toys and games, books

For Adults: Important Papers

Your family disaster supply kit will provide you with the necessary survival supplies for sheltering in place at home or in a community Red Cross shelter.

WINTER SPRINGS POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department is happy to report that crime is still decreasing in Winter Springs.

Overall crime, Part I offenses reported to the State of Florida and the F.B.I., were down again in Winter Springs for the year 2000. They declined from 696 Part I offenses in 1999 to 652 in 2000. The most significant reduction was the decline in Aggravated Assaults. They fell from 64 in 1999 to 38 in 2000 and represent a 41% decrease. Since 1996 Part I offenses in Winter Springs have dropped from 900 to 652 and represents a 27.5% decrease.

Although crime is down, the workload and productivity of the Police Department is up significantly. The Police Department responded to 26,247 calls for service in 1999 and in 2000 responded to 31,628 calls for service. Adult arrests also increased from 603 in 1999 to 729 in 2000.

The Police Department recognizes that they can not fight crime alone. The support and communication the Department receives from the Citizens of Winter Springs, particularly through Neighborhood Watch and the Citizen Advisory Committee, contributes greatly to our steady reduction in crime.




