




WINTER SPRINGS CITY COMMISSION TIGHTENS REIN ON DENSITY...

Following a decision by the Winter Springs City Commission to expand its authority to reduce the density of residential development projects in the City at a March 20, 2006 special meeting, the Commission voted to reduce the density of the proposed development at Oviedo Marketplace from 132 residential units to a maximum of 100 residential units.

Commission Closes Density Loopholes. After a lengthy review of the City's development standards and proposed projects in the City, the Commission found that development in the City was happening according to the City's comprehensive plan. However, the City Commission took action to close loopholes in the zoning ordinance that developers could have interpreted as denying the Commission the authority to reduce densities below authorized maximums. This action gives the Commission clear authority to reduce residential densities, and to require additional green space in development projects when the Commission feels it is necessary to make projects more compatible with surrounding areas and more environmentally friendly.



Most town home and condominium development will take place in the Town Center.

In all areas of the City except the Town Center, the current ratio of single family detached homes to other types of residential development (town homes, condominiums, and apartments) is 71% single family detached to 29% other types.

Winter Springs' 71% ratio of single family detached to other types of residential development is higher than the 53% State ratio, the 61% U.S. ratio and the 64% ratio in Seminole County.

Except in the Town Center, the ratio of single family detached units to other types of residential development is not expected to change significantly through build-out of the City.

No new rental apartment units are on the drawing board at this time anywhere in the City.

Almost all future residential development will consist of high-end, fee simple owned town homes and condominiums located in the Town Center in strict compliance with Town Center Guidelines adopted with overwhelming support of the public in 1998.

CITY DRAWS EASTERN ANNEXATION LINE AT DELEON STREET

In a Special Meeting held on March 6, 2006 called by Mayor John F. Bush, the City Commission unanimously directed the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance declaring the city's intention to terminate the City's eastward expansion at Deleon Street.

This action, led by Mayor Bush and supported unanimously by the Commission, ends several years of conflict between the City of Winter Springs, Oviedo and Seminole County regarding the future of the Black Hammock area of unincorporated Seminole County, and sent a strong message to Oviedo and Seminole County of the City's intention to reconcile differences between the three governmental entities.

DEVELOPMENT ACCORDING TO PLAN

- The Good News is Winter Springs is experiencing an unprecedented period of growth.
- The Better News is it's all happening according to plan.
- The Best News is it's going to raise the quality of life and economic prosperity of our residents.
- The Bad News is, well, there really doesn't seem to be any bad news, as long as we continue to manage our growth in accordance with principles of good urban design and good planning.

The rate of growth which we will continue to encounter over the next five to seven years is a new experience for Winter Springs. This unfamiliar rate of growth may be unsettling to some observers. Indeed, it would be unsettling to me if it wasn't for the fact that it's also happening according to plan. For that reason, the rate of growth we will experience over the next five to seven years is not a threat of a city out of control. To the contrary, it is the thrilling experience of a city realizing its goals and witnessing the vision of its future coming to life in front of our eyes.

Consider these points:

- Our city will be built out in about seven years. At that time, growth will slow to a trickle. Based upon current and proposed projects, our city will build out slightly under its 45,000 population projection with high-end valued development accompanied by an increase in a higher income population.
- Our Town Center will be built out ahead of schedule, with three times the expected \$200 million in property values, and slightly less than the 5,000 projected population.
- The predominately higher income population growth made up of young professionals and retiring baby boomers will have relatively low impacts on municipal services.
- Services will continue to improve as high-end development takes place.
- Extraordinary high-end valued growth has relatively low impacts on city services. This will continue to keep taxes low.

This is not a formula for disaster. It is a formula for great success.

In conclusion, I am convinced that seven years from now when Winter Springs is predominately built out, Winter Springs will continue to be rated one of the best cities in America in which to buy a home, a city with award winning city facilities and services, a city with a beautiful and economically vibrant downtown, and a city with low crime, great schools and low taxes.

Life is good in Winter Springs.

I am very proud to be your City Manager, and very proud of the progress we have made as a Community.

MESSAGE FROM MAYOR JOHN F. BUSH

The level of inaccuracies and omissions contained in the Sentinel's editorial attacks on the integrity of our City are simply unforgivable.

Recent editorials in the Orlando Sentinel portraying Winter Springs as an adversary of rural land preservation are grossly misleading and obviously intended to incite rather than to inform. The level of inaccuracies and omissions contained in the latest April 5th editorial captioned "The new villains" are so outrageous they cannot go unanswered.

I want to share with you my response:

Your editorial, "The new villains" (April 5), is misleading in some ways and flat out wrong in others. While space constraints prevent me from responding to every inaccuracy in your editorial in this letter, I'd like to make a few basic points here to provide your readers with a better, more complete understanding of the issues at stake. I will respond to your editorial in detail in another forum.

First and foremost is the fact the Winter Springs City Commission voted unanimously to permanently place the City's eastern boundary at Deleon Street. This unqualified and unequivocal decision by the City to forgo any annexation into the Black Hammock was conveniently ignored in your editorial. One can only guess why? However, what is undeniably clear is this: **any threat of inappropriate development in the Black Hammock will not be coming from the City of Winter Springs.**

There's a larger issue at hand. This issue concerns the appropriate relationship between county and city governments here in Florida. The City of Winter Springs believes that the traditional, time-tested allocation of decision making authority between the two levels of government works well and shouldn't be radically altered. While this is a far-reaching issue, our position is mainstream and has (so far) been upheld by the courts. It is important to note that even as we support the principle of "home rule", the City of Winter Springs will continue to cooperate closely with the County as well as with Oviedo and other neighboring cities on a variety of different issues, including this one.

Finally, I'd like to take exception to the unnecessarily caustic tone of your editorial. The questions you raise are important and complex; they are matters about which reasonable people can reasonably disagree. Name calling – referring to those who disagree with you as "villains," for example – is not the kind of thoughtful and constructive discussion that the citizens of Central Florida deserve.

While the Sentinel's treatment of the entire matter is inexcusably shoddy, there are important issues involved. It is important that you have the entire picture. For that reason, I am preparing a detailed and factual picture of the City's position on these issues which you will be receiving soon. We believe the City has been acting in your best interest, and when you have had a chance to review all the facts, I think you will agree.

the City of Winter Springs **COMMISSION REPORT**



During the months of December 2005, and January and February 2006 the City Commission approved a Solid Waste Franchise Agreement with Waste Pro of Florida to provide solid waste collection services in Winter Springs utilizing roll out carts; revised the solid waste collection rates; received the Report of the East Rural Area Property Owner's Study Committee recommendations; approved on-street parking for George Street; established recreational use policies for the expansion areas of Central Winds Park; approved a \$430,000 loan from Wachovia Bank on behalf of the Tuscawilla Lighting and Beautification District to install decorative street lights and decorative street signs in Tuscawilla; and passed a resolution supporting the construction of a hospital in Oviedo.

In further action, the Commission entered into a contract with the National Golf Foundation to conduct a study on the feasibility of the City acquiring and operating the Winter Springs Golf Course and passed a resolution declaring the City's intent to enforce its conservation easement over the Winter Springs Golf Course in order to prevent the golf course from being developed for commercial and residential use.

In additional action, the Commission approved an agreement with MV Transportation, Inc. to provide transportation services for senior citizens attending the Winter Springs Senior Center; approved the 2005 Neighborhood Improvement Grant Program providing up to \$15,000 in matching funds for neighborhood beautification projects; and approved covered porches for the Landings at Parkstone, a town home development project.

Mayor Bush presented Commission Resolutions to Mark Queen, Vincent Gianonni, and Tim Pesut for their service on the Board of Trustees; and presented Employee Service Awards to City employees recognizing employees for their tenure with the City.


COMPREHENSIVE ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT

REDUCTION IN DEBT AND INCREASE IN ASSET VALUE

The City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the year ended September 30, 2005 was presented at the City Commission meeting of March 27th by City Auditors McDermitt, Davis, Puckett & Company, LLC. The report showed a \$6,889,399 reduction in total outstanding debt and a \$3,304,965 increase in total net asset value and again demonstrated the on-going financial strength of the City as well as the City's compliance with all relevant accounting standards.

The City also received, for the fifth year in a row, the Government Finance Officers Association's Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for its 2004 CAFR. This prestigious award recognizes excellence in financial reporting by state and local governments.



WINTER SPRINGS VETERANS MEMORIAL MOTORCYCLE RIDE & FUND DAY



MAKING OUR SCHOOLS SAFER

A message from your local school and governmental officials

As a community, Seminole County is known statewide and nationally for its high-performing school system, visionary leadership and exceptional quality of life. Unfortunately, like all other communities throughout the country, Seminole County is not immune to the societal pressures of life in the Twenty-First Century. However, what distinguishes us from others is that Seminole County leaders and citizens are willing to roll up their sleeves, set aside barriers, and work together for the benefit of our most precious resource, our children.

The middle school tragedy that occurred on January 13, 2006 prompted local officials, parents and citizens to ask how they can help ensure, to the best of their abilities, that our schools and communities remain safe. Mayors of all Seminole cities, the County Commission Chairman, the Sheriff, the School Board Chairman and Superintendent of Schools met for a lengthy discussion and now jointly ask families and community members to review and act upon the following suggestions.

- Be aware of what your children have in their pockets, book bags, or automobile when they leave home for school, play, recreation, or entertainment.
- Talk to your children about how easily experts can mistake replica firearms for real weapons. If you have replica firearms or weapons in your home, monitor the use of them and make sure that they are not altered or disguised.
- Make use of the school district's anonymous Speak-Out Hotline (1-800-266-7733) to report non-emergency troubling situations.
- Be aware that each school in the district has an Emergency Procedure Plan in place. Students, teachers and administrators practice these plans and each group is aware of their roles during an emergency or "Code Red" situation.
- Any type of situation involving our children is emotional and urgent. Remain calm and allow the school to implement the Emergency Procedure Plan. As soon as the situation has been assessed and deemed safe, parents may then check their child(ren) out of school.
- Please be sure you update your phone contact information as often as necessary. It is essential that a current phone number be on file for each student so that call systems can be utilized.
- In today's busy society, "time" is the greatest gift we can give our children. Set aside a regular time each day to listen and talk. If you or your child becomes aware of a potential conflict or crime at school or in the community, call your school or local law enforcement agency immediately.

Seminole County is and will continue to be a safe, family friendly community. As we join together in this effort, each of us, parents, family members, school personnel, and community members, can be positive role models. All of our futures are in the hands of our children.




WINTER SPRINGS INAUGURAL SPRING FESTIVAL EXCEEDS ALL EXPECTATIONS

FIRE FLASH! Fire Department Important Safety Reminder!

Please Remember to Properly Display Your Address

Why is Addressing Important? Because when it comes to emergency services, every second counts! Your Address is how Emergency Services such as Fire, Ambulance, and Police find you during an emergency! **If we can't find you we can't help you when you need us most!**

What Can You Do? Prominently displaying your address will assist in the easy identification of your residence and/or business. Address numbers on buildings which are less than fifty feet from the street or driving lane of the parking lot for plazas, multi-tenant or rear access should be affixed directly over the main egress door and all other means of egress. Address numbers should contrast with the surrounding surface, be of durable material and be a minimum of three inches (3") in height and one-half inch (1/2") in width. Buildings which are over fifty (50) feet from the street shall be required to use five inch (5") or larger numbers. Also, when you place your address number on your mailbox, please be sure to number both sides as emergency units can generally arrive in both directions.
